**Martin Luther King Day:** A federal holiday honoring the birth of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Born on January 15, 1929, Martin Luther King Jr. grew to become one of the greatest Social Activists the world has ever known. At 35, he became the youngest person to win the Nobel Peace prize. He was assassinated on April 4, 1968 while making a speech from the balcony of his hotel room in Memphis, Tennessee. His birthday became a National Holiday by an act of Congress in 1983. Many consider it a day to serve one's community.

**Bob Moses:** As a field secretary for the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee in the early 1960s, Moses registered Black people in Mississippi to vote and was also a lead organizer of Freedom Summer which brought hundreds of White Northern Volunteers to Mississippi to register voters and to teach in Freedom Schools. In the 1980s at the *King Open School*, Moses founded the Algebra Project, a national program to increase math literacy in communities of color.
