■ ■ ■ Letter from the Superintendent

Welcome to Cambridge,

The public schools in our city are built on a foundation of academic excellence and committed to promoting an environment of social justice. We believe that all students deserve the very best education—this means that every child should develop basic skills, experience solid core curriculum, and explore his or her own unique self through a variety of school-based and community-based opportunities. Cambridge is a great place to raise kids.



In our school system, most of the schools are organized around the K-8 Model (Kindergarten through 8th grade). One school, the Haggerty, houses grades K-6 only. Our high school, Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, educates roughly 1500 students in grades 9-12. For the 2009/10 and 2010/11 school years, all freshmen will attend the 9th Grade Campus program housed at the Longfellow School, just down Broadway from CRLS. This change in the 9th grade program will allow a safe and efficient renovation project at the main high school building to be completed by the start of the September, 2011 school year.

The basic core curriculum is the same in all of Cambridge's elementary schools. What distinguishes our approach is that in addition to that strong core, each school maintains its own unique identity through a series of special programs which are described in this booklet.

Cambridge is well known for our Controlled Choice policy, which aims to balance the student population at every school according to a family's socio-economic status. In other words, our community believes that students learn best when they work with peers of differing backgrounds and that they benefit not only academically but also by developing that strong sense of social justice.

The Controlled Choice policy is governed by the Cambridge School Committee and is reviewed each year to determine how effectively the balancing has been achieved. As soon as you are ready to register for school, you should contact the Family Resource Center at 617-349-6551. The staff there will help you understand the policy and offer you the chance to visit several schools before you make a choice for your child(ren).

Perhaps the most important choice you can make about your child's education is to be actively involved in it. Help them with homework, get involved in the school, attend events, volunteer...the possibilities are endless for ways in which parents can help their sons and daughters succeed. Talk to your child's teacher or principal and ask them for ideas on how you can help.

This booklet contains a lot of helpful information, so please take the time to read it carefully. As you read, you will begin to get the idea of what makes Cambridge Public Schools special. But this is just the beginning—as the years unfold, you will recognize and appreciate the value of a CPS education. It takes young people to great places. We welcome you to our community and invite you to be our partner as our talented faculty and staff do their important work with all the children of the city.

■ ■ ■ Size of School District

Cambridge has 12 elementary schools and one comprehensive high school serving a total of approximately 6,000 students. The students and their families are served by more than 700 teachers and assisted by more than 450 support personnel.

■ ■ ■ Community Information

With over 100,000 people located in a 6.5 square mile area, Cambridge is a unique community with a strong mix of cultural and social diversity, intellectual vitality, and technological innovation. Adjacent to Boston, Cambridge is considered by many to be one of the most cosmopolitan intersections of individuals and ideas in the world.

The city is home to educational institutions such as Harvard University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Lesley University, and a range of other schools. Clearly, Cambridge has set a standard for academic superiority.

Rich in cultural traditions, economy, and natural resources, Cambridge maintains its strength through the cooperative efforts of a diverse population striving to live, learn, and work together.

New to Cambridge Public Schools?

The Family Resource Center registers students for school. Members of the FRC staff work with families on an individual basis to ensure access to the information and services that families need to support their children during and after school.

Families moving to Cambridge or transferring from a charter or private school need to complete a full application package.

In Cambridge, you have your choice of schools.

Students register and are assigned to a school in Cambridge under a Controlled Choice Plan. The plan uses a variety of diversity factors and assignment preferences, including socioeconomic status (determined by free and reduced price meal eligibility), siblings, proximity, and race or ethnicity. When parents or guardians complete their application forms at the Family Resource Center, they have the option of identifying up to three schools they would prefer their child attend. At that time they will be asked to voluntarily indicate eligibility for free and reduced price meals.

The goal for the 2009-10 school year is for each grade in each school to be within a range of plus or minus 15% of the district-wide K-8 percentage of students who are eligible for free and reduced price meals.

Kindergarten Registration Cycles

Registration cycles are held on a monthly basis. The first cycle occurs throughout the month of January (1/2/09 - 1/31/09) for enrollment the following September. Families are encouraged to register during the first cycle of registration. For the current school year, over 90% of all families received one of their first three choices of schools in the first registration cycle.

The Cambridge Public Schools encourage families to visit schools, take tours and attend School Information Fairs held in October. For additional information, contact each school's Family Liaison.

Children spend two years in kindergarten if they have not turned 5 on or before Aug. 31, prior to entering kindergarten.

Grades 1-8 Registration

The registration process for grades 1-8 occurs throughout the year. Once an application is complete, it is processed immediately and an assignment is made.

Required for Registration

- The child's birth certificate or passport
- Current immunization record, month/day/year of vaccinations
- A notarized Certificate of Address form (available at schools, the FRC, and our web site, www.cpsd.us)
- A current lease or mortgage statement
- A utility bill (gas, electric or cable only)
- For families from another Massachusetts school system: Massachusetts Transfer/Discharge Slip
- Valid driver's license or state issued ID
- CPS Meals Application
- CPS Language Survey Form

International and Second Language Families

If a language other than English is spoken at home, the student is referred to the Language Assessment Coordinator. The coordinator administers the Step-by-Step Assessment to Language Dominance to determine the kind of program or English as a Second Language support that would provide the best educational setting for the student.

For students who are limited English proficient, Cambridge offers Sheltered English Immersion (SEI) instruction in classrooms at the Tobin, Graham & Parks and the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Schools. Students are instructed to speak, read, and write fluently in English as preparation for entering grade level mainstream classrooms, two-way language immersion classrooms, or modified bilingual programs.

Students whose parents choose a two-way language immersion program (Amigos' Spanish/English program or King Open's Olá Portuguese/English program) receive English and native language assessments to determine the student's language levels in both languages. Student assignment is based on Cambridge Public Schools Policy for placement in two-way language immersion education.

■ ■ ■ Transportation



The Cambridge Public Schools provide transportation to and from schools for over 2,500 students. The following are some frequently asked questions asked of our transportation department.

Who is eligible to ride the city school buses?

- All kindergarten through sixth grade students who must walk one mile or more and all 7th and 8th grade students who must walk 1.5 or more miles to attend their assigned schools.
- All kindergarten through sixth grade students who must cross Mass. Ave, Fresh Pond Parkway, McGrath Highway or Alewife Brook Parkway, or who must cross the railroad tracks at Sherman Street or from Binney Street to Main Street between the Fletcher-Maynard Academy and the Kennedy-Longfellow Schools.

Where and when will my child be picked up and dropped off?

- Just prior to the start of school, the transportation department sends letters to families of transportation eligibility, including all bus schedule information such as the time and location of their bus stops.

What are the bus rules and regulations?

- Shouting, yelling, standing, or moving about the bus is distracting to the driver – students must engage in respectful behavior
- No eating or drinking while on the bus
- Pushing, shoving, or bullying is not permitted
- Animals are not allowed
- Sharp objects may not be brought on the bus
- Hands, feet, or other body parts and all objects must be kept inside the bus and out of the aisle

These common sense rules are in place to insure the safety of all children on school buses. Riding the bus is a privilege. If these rules aren't followed, Level One infraction consequences will apply.

Serious misbehavior can result in an immediate five day suspension from the bus. Level Two infractions include:

- Threatening or attacking others
- Stealing from others
- Vandalizing
- Possessing a weapon, an illegal substance such as drugs or alcohol, lighters, matches, or other fire producing items.

What happens if my student misbehaves?

The school principal who has received an incident report of Level One infractions will contact the family. Level Two infractions result in suspension with the family notified immediately. Please review the complete discipline policy in the *Rights and Responsibilities Handbook*, which can be found online at www.cpsd.us.

Can family members ride the bus?

No unauthorized adults are allowed on our buses.

What happens if no one meets my child at the bus stop?

All K-2 students must have a yellow ID tag (issued by the school) to ride the bus. Parents must arrange to have K-2 children met at their bus stop. If the child's greeter is not at the stop, properly tagged students will not be permitted to get off the bus. They will be taken to the Safety and Security Office at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, 459 Broadway. (617) 349-6772

Who else gets dropped off at the Safety and Security Office?

- Children who have fallen asleep or forgotten to get off the bus at the correct stop
- Children whose family forgot that it was an early release day (see calendar on inside back cover)
- Children who were on the wrong bus
- Children who have misbehaved

Can my child take a different bus in the afternoon to an after school program?

Yes. Make a request through your school or the transportation department.

What about special needs students?

Door-to-door transportation is provided for special needs students. Parents must read carefully the rules regarding this service. They include:

- Drivers will leave 2 minutes after sounding horn.
- Families must call SP&R to report an absence: 1-781-224-0003.
- Parents must call 617-349-6862 to resume services after a 3-day or more absence.
- A parent or authorized representative must be present to receive children at drop-off, or they will be taken to the Office of Special Education at 159 Thorndike Street in East Cambridge. 617-349-6500

Did You Know?

The Amigos School is founded on a dual-language (Spanish/English) immersion model. Dual language education is a dynamic form of education that holds great promise for developing high levels of academic achievement, bilingualism and biliteracy, and cross-cultural awareness among students.

Dual-language education contributes to long-term education and preparation of students as life-long learners and successful citizens in an increasingly culturally, linguistically and ethnically diverse society.

Our standards-based instruction in two languages ensures that all students are able to achieve high standards as measured by the state and local tests.

Highlights:

- ★ *Reading Buddies/Lectores y Amiguitos* - Bilingual Volunteers from Harvard University School of Education and Cambridge School Volunteers visit the school on a weekly basis to read aloud and share conversations with students. The program is designed to foster a love of reading in Spanish and English.
- ★ The *Discovering Justice* curriculum in grades 1-2 uses children's literature to teach social justice and peaceful coexistence by encouraging students to become engaged citizens in their school and community.
- ★ The *Science Club for Girls* provides a chance for girls in grades K-8 to meet in a girl-friendly environment to learn about science. Girls work with female volunteers who present fun, hands-on activities in an after-school club.
- ★ *CitySprouts* maintains a courtyard garden to promote science, and a hands-on connection to the food cycle and the natural environment through sustainable agriculture.
- ★ *Sports4Kids* provides a variety of age-appropriate activities developed to engage children in positive play at recess, during, before and after-school. The program is lead by an enthusiastic and well - trained bilingual adult.

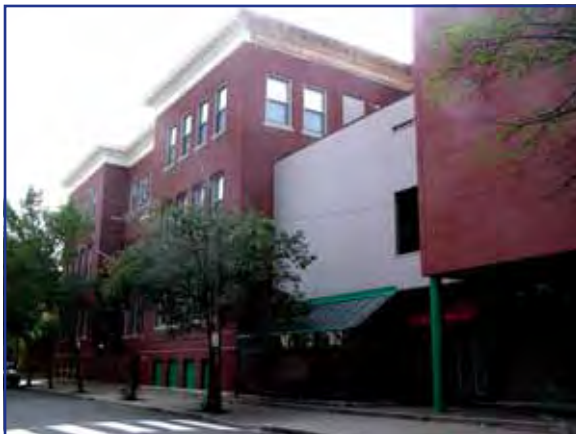
Now approaching our third year, the Middle School has pioneered the implementation of an extremely successful social framework known as Developmental Designs. Fostering a sense of community and strong relationship building are highly correlated to student success. Accordingly, this program provides the resources and training to teachers and staff to meet the unique developmental needs of this age group including creating a sense of belonging, gradually releasing responsibility, providing a great deal of academic choice, and building in fun to daily work. Developmental Designs is tightly aligned with The Responsive Classroom framework, which is implemented in all of our K-5 classrooms.

The Maria L. Baldwin School is located between Porter and Harvard Squares on the corner of Sacramento and Oxford, just off of Massachusetts Avenue. Situated in the historic Agassiz neighborhood, Baldwin is enhanced by many local artists. Building features include handmade stained-glass windows and intriguing architectural elements such as skylights, large circular windows, and the ornate wood door from the original building in 1875.

Did You Know?

The central concept of Cambridgeport is one of developmental learning, which carries with it a belief that children develop in similar ways but that each child has his or her own pace and style of development, and that each child brings the culture and beliefs of his/her home to the learning process. Thus, we can look at each child's particular interests, experiences, and strengths as an important key to the learning process.

Our staff believes children learn from the examples of adults and older children. They also learn from and teach each other. All the teachers in our school share the philosophy of developmental learning. Teachers provide learning experiences which guide and capture our students' interests, helping develop the critical thinking and problem solving skills to succeed in life.

The Cambridgeport Legacy: 8th Grade students leave behind a lasting legacy at the end of their schooling at CPort. Students create 3-dimensional self-portrait tiles that are mounted on the walls.

Highlights:

- ★ The Cambridgeport School is renowned for its Comprehensive Student Portfolios. The portfolios capture highlights of each student's K-8 career, resulting in a dissertation-type presentation to a panel of community members at the end of eighth grade.
- ★ Most classes are comprised of two grades, allowing students to spend two years with the same teacher.
- ★ Academic and enrichment programs and partnerships include: Novartis Scientist Penpals, Underground Railway Theatre, Science Clubs, After-school Literacy Share and Math Enrichment.
- ★ A Sampling of CPort Events: Curriculum Breakfasts, Fun Run, Fit Fridays, Spring Fling, Multicultural Dinner Night, Drama Field Day and Spaghetti Dinner Night, March Madness.

- ★ The Fletcher Maynard Academy is an extended day school. The eight hour school day allows for expanded learning time and learning opportunities not available at most schools. The longer school day provides students with more learning experiences in the core content areas: language arts, mathematics, social studies, and science, and in enrichment opportunities like drama, dance, art and music.
- ★ FMA offers intensive technology integration in grades 5-8. Each student receives their own laptop for research, creating multimedia presentations and completing daily classroom projects and assignments.
- ★ Students in grades 6-8 participate in unique international educational travel opportunities (Costa Rica, London, Mexico, Africa). Students in grades 3-5 travel within the U.S. and students in all grades participate in numerous field trips.

The mission of the Graham & Parks Alternative School is to educate the whole child: to help every child fully develop his or her unique intellectual, social and emotional capabilities. Believing that all children can meet high standards and become lifelong learners, we foster a child-centered learning environment in which children build upon their individual strengths while always being challenged to expand their skills and reach for new goals. Because curiosity and focused inquiry drive genuine learning, we strive for a classroom experience that engages children as active learners who take full ownership of their education. We pursue our mission as a democratic school community that values and relies upon the ideas, experiences, and talents of all our members, working together—teachers, students, parents, administrators, and staff.

The Graham and Parks School is located between Porter and Harvard Squares on Linnaean Street, which runs perpendicular to Garden Street and Mass Ave. in West Cambridge. The school features a large playground and garden style courtyard that houses Citysprouts.

Highlights:

- ★ The Graham & Parks School is named for two strong women, Rosa Parks and Sandra Graham. The multicultural content of our curriculum and our vision of social justice is a tribute to their work.
- ★ Our school features multi-grade classrooms and looping single-grade classrooms in grades K-6, Sheltered English Immersion classrooms in grades 1 - 6 and a collaborative team structure for grades 7 and 8. Classroom lessons are taught through project-based teaching and learning.
- ★ Graham and Parks students demonstrate ownership of their knowledge through portfolios and public presentations of their work. Public presentations include Democracy Symposiums, Immigration Monologues, and a panel review of portfolio presentations.
- ★ Seventh and eighth grade students participate in a Humanities curriculum that includes Justice and Dissent, Immigration studies, a rigorous Math and Science curriculum, community service opportunities, and student government.

- ★ Programs include CIAO, an Italian language program for grades K-2, *Intergenerational Literacy*, and the *Artist-in-Residence* program sponsored by the Haggerty Arts Council.
- ★ Participation in the *Museum Loan Network* at MIT makes objects of cultural heritage accessible and understandable to students by sharing these works over extended periods of time.
- ★ The Haggerty School features a combined auditorium and gymnasium, two playgrounds, renowned CitySprouts flower and vegetable gardens, mosaic tile artwork, a computer lab, and computers in every classrooms.

The staff, working closely with parents, endeavors to provide a classroom program that supports the learning needs and interests of all its students. Our classrooms are designed to support the grouping of students in natural proportions by gender, by race, by social economic background, and mental or physical challenges. 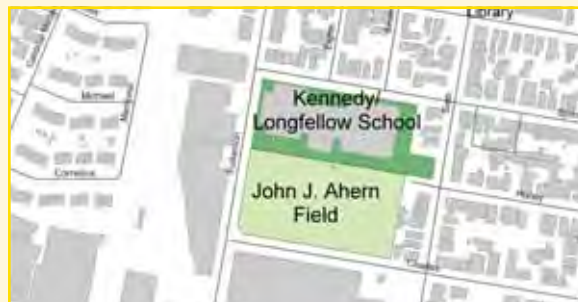
The mission of the Kennedy-Longfellow School is to prepare our students to become life long learners. The staff is committed to providing students with “real life” curriculum connections through field experiences, which further expand learning, and promote awareness of each individual’s role in a global community.

Our school fosters a climate of respect, responsibility and inclusiveness. Our various academic programs, partnerships, and extra-curricular opportunities enhance our continued pursuit of academic excellence.

Located in East Cambridge near Ahern Field, the Kennedy-Longfellow School features spacious classrooms, two computer labs (PC and Mac), and dedicated classroom space for Library/Media, Art, Music and a full-size gymnasium and auditorium. Outdoor facilities include a large field for soccer and baseball, a basketball court and two fully equipped playground areas for younger children.

- ★ The Intensive Studies Program (ISP) - Students in grades 6-8 who are committed to and enjoy academic challenges may apply to this program from the entire Cambridge Public School district. Students are admitted based on motivation to learn and capacity for independent work.
- ★ Keypals - Sixth grade students are paired with volunteers from MIT, Draper Labs and IBM in a language arts based e-mail program. The mentor and students collaborate on various academic projects to improve writing skills. A Keypal luncheon at the end of the year celebrates the mentoring friendships formed in this program.
- ★ Science Olympiad - This intensive program prepares students to create long term science projects that meet national competition standards. Our school successfully competes in varied events throughout the state several times per school year.
- ★ Mock Trial - Harvard Law School students partner with our eighth graders to prepare and present a legal case, as well as practice their communication and persuasion skills. Students also learn how the legal system works.
- ★ Developmental Designs - All students in grades 6, 7 & 8 participate in a daily advisory program. Teachers are trained in Developmental Design and use the tools to provide each student with a sense of significance, belonging, and fun.

Highlights:

- ★ King Open is committed to in-depth learning within and across traditional disciplines. Themes and topics are pursued over several months in all grades. Some themes include Family, Community Origins, the Renaissance, the Middle Ages, Study of the Charles River, the Industrial Revolution, Africa, Apartheid, the American Revolution, Resistance to Slavery, U.S. Governmental Structure, China, and the Middle East.
- ★ Art, music, dance, and theatre enhance classroom learning. Multi-arts projects culminate in many individual and classroom presentations and celebrations. Some examples are the Renaissance Crafts Project and Fair, the Shakespeare and African epic plays, the Middle East Architecture presentations, Mayan Museum, Famous Women Oratories, Charles River Tables, and an Ellis Island Simulation.
- ★ Field trips supporting our curriculum are abundant. Trips include a Mock Boston Massacre Trial at Faneuil Hall, hiking and canoeing along the Charles River, the Mayor of Cambridge's office, Plimoth Plantation and Sturbridge Village, and the 7/8 grade trip to Washington, D.C.



Did You Know?

At King Open, parents may choose the Olá Program for their children. Olá is our two-way bilingual program in which students develop academic excellence in English and Portuguese through following the King Open curriculum in self-contained classrooms.

Our school fosters close teacher-student relationships through multi-graded classrooms. Community extends and is supported outside each classroom. Teachers collaborate in multi-graded teams to construct curriculum, assess student learning, set goals, and to support each other personally and professionally.

There are many opportunities for parents to be involved at the school; through working with their own kids on school work, joining King Open committees such as arts, gardening, technology, outreach, literacy, fundraising or volunteering for the many community building events that occur at King Open.

Did You Know?

The Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. School is one of only a few expanded learning schools in the nation. The eight hour school day allows for extended learning time and hands-on learning opportunities not available at most schools. The longer school day provides students with more project-based learning experiences in the core content areas: language arts, mathematics, social studies, and science, and in enrichment opportunities like Journalism, Marine Biology, Pottery, Fencing and Ballet.

Our school building is located just outside of Harvard Square. It was constructed in 1972 and won accolades for its architecture. The building is shared by the Amigos School and offers families a beautiful park for recess, an auditorium, two gymnasiums, a library with Spanish and Chinese literature, a full media center, and a courtyard garden. All classes work in our CitySprouts garden, learning science and social studies concepts in a project-based fashion.

Highlights:

- ★ Every student chooses an elective course each semester. These courses meet twice a week for students in JK-5 and daily for students in middle school. Just a few of the courses we offer are: Spanish, African Drumming, Film Making and Yoga.
- ★ Our use of technology in all areas of the curriculum makes us special. Students develop PowerPoint and other multimedia presentations to share their research with classmates and the community. All students develop electronic portfolios that may include their artwork, clips of them speaking Chinese, reading a poem, or playing on a sports team.
- ★ Students study Mandarin Chinese for thirty minutes daily beginning with songs and poetry in junior kindergarten and continuing through grade 8 to learn Chinese characters, a spoken vocabulary, and Chinese culture. In their eighth grade year, students travel to Hangzhou, China - free of charge, thanks to our generous funders - to visit our sister school and practice their Chinese language skills.
- ★ Our partnership with the Museum of Science enhances science concepts through hands-on experiences.

Highlights:

- ★ The Morse School features one of the most expansive and educational garden programs in the city, allowing students to develop a love of nature, an appreciation for healthy eating and the environment, and a skill of gardening. The CitySprouts program develops in children a unique appreciation for vegetables, flowers, science, and more importantly, the world around them.
- ★ Connections with local colleges and universities provide volunteers who work with students and teachers. The Power Lunch Reading Program matches more than 100 students with reading buddies from local businesses.
- ★ Since 2002, the middle grades have undergone a complete revitalization. A \$20,000 science endowment supported the purchase of safety equipment, lab upgrades, and expansion of science teaching materials and technology. Interactive white boards are used in all classrooms. There are small groups for literacy, the Kids to Court program in Social Studies, and expanded Spanish language and cultural exposure. Students in grade 8 develop a portfolio presentation in the four core subjects.



Did You Know?

The Morse School is the only Cambridge public school to follow Core Knowledge, which is similar to the national curricula used in other academically successful countries. Core Knowledge curriculum provides a detailed sequence of content in the major subject areas. This guarantees that all Morse children will be provided with a rich, varied, challenging, and cohesive course of studies from preschool through the 8th grade. The staff uses a variety of teaching methods and resources to give the students a solid foundation of knowledge and a place where they can develop respect for self and others, a sense of civic responsibility, and an appreciation of people of diverse backgrounds and beliefs. The Core Knowledge sequence is infused with district & state requirements.

The Morse School building was renovated and enlarged in 1998. Its unique layout - a one level building that stretches along the Charles River at the base of the Cambridgeport neighborhood - is popular with parents and visitors. It has several playgrounds and is adjacent to a city ballfield.

The Peabody School is a large, spacious, and newly-renovated building in North Cambridge that features a state-of-the-art learning facility, a *CitySprouts* garden, and several playgrounds.

The Peabody School community has created “To Achieve Success”, our social contract.

To Achieve Success...

- We do our personal best.
- We respect others and ourselves.
- We are responsible for our choices and actions.
- We cooperate to maintain a safe community.
- We celebrate our rich diversity.

This contract aligns with our Responsive Classroom (PrK-5) and Developmental Design(6-8) modeling. At the beginning of each day, all adults and children gather in a circle at Morning Meeting, where they greet each other, share important news, engage in lively activity together and read a daily message from the teacher. This structure provides children with valuable social-emotional and academic skills that carry over to the rest of the school day.

Highlights:

- ★ The music program at the Peabody School is based on the Kodaly Philosophy of music education that states, “Music is for everyone.” Music literacy is the main focus in a Kodaly classroom. Our students explore what it means to become a musician. The environment rich with a multitude of experiences from *play party* games to *creative movement*. The focus of study on beat and pitch lays the groundwork for the years to come. The children continuously strive to master a steady beat and sing in tune while becoming comfortable with their own singing voices.
- ★ The Intensive Studies Program is for highly-motivated middle grade students. Created in the 1960s as an accelerated program, the ISP has been transformed to help those students who enjoy academic challenges. Students are accepted into the program based on a motivation to learn, a willingness to work on study skills, and a capacity for independent work.
- ★ The Peabody School is a Professional Development School with Lesley University. This partnership helps to support staff development as well as family’s support of their children’s learning.
- ★ The Peabody School was included in Boston Magazine’s list of the 100 best public elementary schools in eastern Massachusetts.

- ★ The Tobin School is the city's first publicly owned and operated Montessori school.
- ★ Located a few blocks from Fresh Pond, the Tobin Montessori School is free to city residents and staffed with Montessori certified teachers.
- ★ One of just a handful of public Montessori schools in Massachusetts — there are less than 200 public Montessori schools in the U.S. — the Tobin was one of the first regular education schools in Massachusetts to admit children ages three, four and five to an educational program in 2007.
- ★ The program will be expanded one grade level per year, allowing current Tobin students to graduate and incoming Montessori students to matriculate.
- ★ Currently we have Children's House (ages 3-6) and the 1st level of Lower Elementary classrooms (ages 6-7).



Did You Know?

The Montessori method of teaching was created in 1907 by Italy's Maria Montessori, a renowned physician, psychologist and philosopher. The Montessori method of education is based upon Dr. Montessori's scientific observations of children's almost effortless ability to absorb knowledge from their surroundings, as well as their tireless interest in manipulating materials. Children teach themselves. This simple but profound truth inspired Dr. Montessori's lifelong pursuit of educational reform, methodology, psychology, teaching, and teacher training — all based on her dedication to furthering the self-creating process of the child.

While the current approach and materials used in AMS accredited schools of today have been modernized and incorporate the use of technology, the underlying premises of developmental and exploratory learning remain strong.

Media Literacy Program - The overarching philosophy behind Media Literacy is that it is just as important for children to learn how to "read" the messages from television, movies, advertisements, newspapers, and the internet, as it is to learn how to read the words on a page.

CRLS is a comprehensive high school comprised of four learning communities and the Rindge School of Technical Arts (RSTA).

Facility

Preparation work began in July 2008 for renovations to the two buildings that comprise CRLS. Improvements include new lighting, windows, and roof, upgraded HVAC and electrical systems, new science labs and technology centers, modern cafeteria, and renovations to the performing arts center. The Rindge School of Technical Arts (RSTA), located within CRLS, was renovated in 2001, and features state-of-the-art facilities, including a new media lab.

Athletic Facilities

The CRLS athletic facilities include the War Memorial Building which reopened in December 2008 with new floors and bleachers in the gym, new air conditioning, improvements to the pool and ventilation system, and new fitness rooms and equipment. Tennis courts are located on the CRLS campus. The athletic fields are located in North Cambridge at Danehy Park and Russell Field, which opened in 2005 with a new football field, lights and field house. The golf team practices at the Thomas P. O'Neill, Jr. Municipal Golf Course at Fresh Pond and the crew team uses the Cambridge Boat House. The War Memorial facilities, tennis courts and Frisoli Field House are available to Cambridge residents when not in use by the school.

RSTA's Media Arts Studio (seen in the photo above) features the same state-of-the-art equipment found at CNN or ESPN studios, including a 3-camera production studio and control room, a master control room for transmission of three community cable channels, an editing lab, and field production equipment.

Students in RSTA's Biotechnology laboratory use state-of-the-art equipment to conduct some of the same experiments and projects – including splitting genome cells – that just 20 years ago were prerequisites for doctoral level scientists.

Technical concentrations are currently available in Automotive Technology, Biotechnology, Business Education, Carpentry, Commercial Design, Culinary Arts & Hospitality, Engineering, Graphic Communications, Health Assisting, Information Technology, and Media Technology (TV Broadcasting).

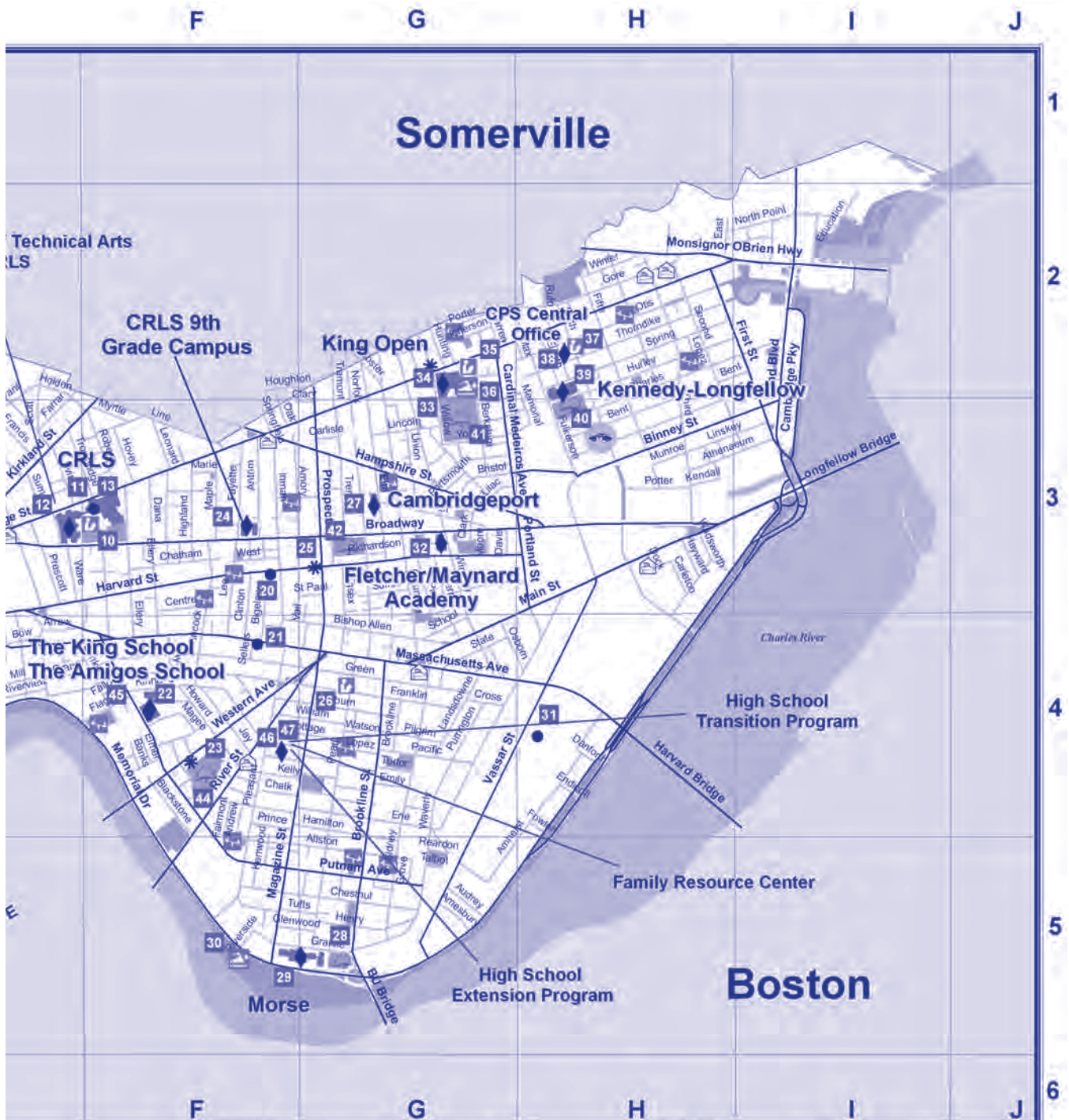

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“This is so great!” exclaimed a surprised 3rd grader when he tasted a sample of a new soup recipe made with fresh local farm produce. The Tasty Choices food service program brings more new dishes to school lunch every year. Many soups, salads and entrees are now prepared from fresh whole ingredients each school kitchen on a daily basis. A third generation family farmer from Lunenburg, MA, is supplying the schools with a variety of fresh fruit and vegetables in season.

School Food Service strives to create a healthy eating environment through the choices we serve. Healthy choices include: fresh soups and entrees, fresh local vegetables, fresh fruit, whole wheat bread and buns, veggie wraps, and low fat milk and yogurt without artificial color or flavor. Caesar salad is a popular alternative on pizza-Fridays.

School Lunch

All lunches are prepared in kitchens at each of the schools. Lunches provide a hot entrée on a rotating menu. Favorites are chicken cacciatore, turkey hot dogs on whole wheat buns, and lightly steamed broccoli with low fat ranch dip. Alternative choices to the hot entrée include yogurt and graham crackers, veggie wraps on select days, and peanut butter & jelly or cheese sandwiches. Carrot and celery sticks and a variety of fresh fruits are also available at lunch, and children may always come back for more on all fruits and vegetables.

School Breakfast

Breakfast is available in all schools and includes assorted low-sugar high fiber cold cereals, low-fat milk, a variety of fresh seasonal fruit, juice and a rotating selection of items such as muffins and yogurt.

Menu Development

The Tasty Choices menu development program, with an emphasis on local vegetable and fruit dishes, works with a part time chef and school nutrition staff from the Cambridge Public Health Department. The chef develops new recipes and coaches kitchen staff. Tasty Choices offers taste tests at lunch and engages in educational activities with CitySprouts garden program. Children frequently ask for school lunch dishes at home, so we often send home recipes. This provides support for children to make healthy eating choices both at home and at school.

Our Schools

The Cambridge Public Schools Food Service department participates in the National School Lunch, School Breakfast, and After School Snack Programs, including the special Fruit and Vegetable Snack program. It provides breakfast and lunch to 13 schools in 12 locations in Cambridge and fruit and vegetable snacks to students in 3 school locations. After school snacks are provided to 7 programs in 5 different schools.

Everyone Returns Free and Reduced Price

Applications

All families are asked to fill out a free and reduced-price application whether you think you qualify or not. This allows food service to maximize the government reimbursement program. Many children qualify for free or reduced-price daily meals.

Meal Payment

Families can pay for school meals via check payable to Cambridge Public Schools, mailed directly to the Food Service Department (address below), or bring cash or a check to your school cafeteria and leave it in a specially marked envelope with the cashier. Payment should go to the cafeteria cashier, but teachers may assist with the process, especially in the lower grades. Ask your child’s teacher how this is handled at your school. Schools use electronic meal cards that are swiped each time a meal is purchased. We want to be able to keep up the high quality of our meals, and due to the rising cost of food and utilities, the cost of meals has been raised for the first time in 6 years. School lunch is still a great value when compared to a similar meal from home, and so convenient!

As described in the Wellness policy, CPS Food Service strives to:

- Provide healthy and appealing choices
- Maximize the amount of fresh fruits and vegetables provided
- Provide school meals which are low in fat and sugar
- Provide meals which are high in fiber and whole grains, with a goal of no less than 50% whole grains
- Provide age appropriate portion sizes and offer additional servings only of fruits and vegetables.

■ ■ ■ TITLE 1 Program

Title I is the largest federal aid program in our schools. Title I provides additional resources and instruction to improve the educational performance of low achieving children in high poverty schools. Its goal is to help those children meet challenging state academic content and performance standards.

Title I schoolwide programs exist in eight of the twelve Cambridge public schools: Amigos, Fletcher-Maynard Academy, Kennedy-Longfellow, King, King Open, Morse, Peabody and Tobin. Schoolwide programs have a poverty level greater than 40% and a goal of helping all students in the school.

The Title I Program has a three purposes: 1) to provide additional instruction in the areas of reading and math either via a “co-teaching” model or direct service (either “push-in” or “pull-out” to underachieving students; 2) to help support professional development for teachers by strengthening their understanding of the literacy and math goals of the district and state; 3) to increase parental capacity by conducting workshops and disseminating information to help empower parents and to stress the importance of family involvement.

Under the No Child Left Behind Act, parents have certain responsibilities and play an important role in helping raise student achievement. Parents in schools that have an “accountability status” must be offered choice of transfer to another school that has made AYP (adequate yearly progress) and some children in Title I schools are eligible for supplemental educational services – extra tutoring outside of the school day.

Schools that receive Title I funds must work with parents to create a “home-school compact.” Each school has a compact that outlines how the school, family and child will share responsibilities for raising achievement. In addition, each school has a Family Involvement Policy.



Some ways that you may see Title I in Cambridge schools: Reading/Math Specialists; Reading Recovery Teachers; After School/Saturday MCAS Programs; Book Room Materials; MCAS/Homework Help Workshops for parents; Books for Bingo; Summer Literacy Camps. The Title I Program also publishes a monthly calendar for families containing school and community-based activities; parent information (e.g. MCAS, School Report Card information, Curriculum Highlights) and booklists published three times a year to coincide with school vacations.

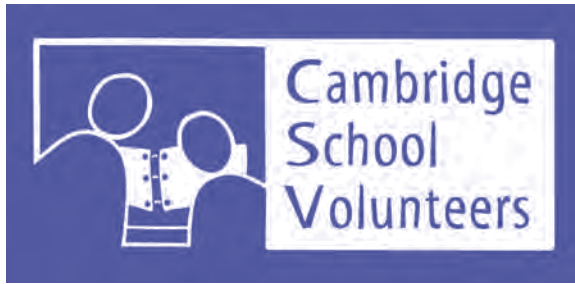
Create Organize Respond Evaluate: C.O.R.E.

Highlights

For more than 40 years, CSV has worked in collaboration with the educators of the Cambridge Public Schools to offer innovative, high-quality volunteer programs in every school. About 900 volunteers are involved each year.

At the elementary level, CSV volunteers assist teachers in classrooms and libraries. Many work with beginning readers as literacy volunteers in a school’s Writers Workshop or publishing center. Some participate one-to-one as math volunteers with 2nd and 3rd graders. Some offer tutorial and small group support to 6th-8th graders in the AVID program, while still others provide after-school homework help or MCAS support. In addition, several hundred corporate employees volunteer as Reading Buddies or KeyPals/NetPals (email communication).

At the high school, volunteers participate as one-to-one tutors in the CSV Tutoring Center. Help is available before, during or after-school, and in any subject. In addition to tutoring, volunteers provide advising to students competing in the annual Science Olympiad, as well as both library and classroom assistance. A large part of the high school program also includes College Planning and Essay Writing assistance.
