A LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Cambridge Early Childhood Community,

As our team has been busy planning for our annual Week of the Young Child event, as well as for the launch of the Cambridge Preschool Program (UPK), there have been lots of conversations around the office about how to continue to elevate our profession. At the center of these conversations is often a discussion about what people outside of our profession call us.


A friend and early childhood colleague of mine recently wrote a great article on the "D" word...that's right... "Daycare". Known to many of us within the profession as a phrase you simply do not say, many outside of the profession use this term without even knowing the impact. Some people mistakenly use it interchangeably with the term "childcare" or "early childhood education", while others use it as a term to signify something lesser than "preschool" or "early childhood education".

The term daycare is deeply rooted in the historical beginnings of the profession, but as you fast forward to today, it does not quite capture all that this skilled work entails. Early childhood educators do not take care of days, rather they care for and educate young children. The work requires specialized knowledge and expertise and is complex. Professionals in this field are in the business of supporting the growth and development of little humans during the most rapid period of brain development they will experience in their lifetime!

So just as we would never want to call a person by the wrong name, it's important to share with those outside our field that they too, should call us by the correct name. This is childcare. This is early care and education. We are educators.

CHECK OUT WHAT WE'RE CELEBRATING THIS MONTH!



The Cambridge Office of Early Childhood (COEC), formerly B3, has <u>New Preschool</u> <u>Scholarships</u> for Cambridge children from households with low-income.

Children must be 2 years and 9 months or older by August 25, 2023 to qualify for preschool.

If awarded a scholarship, children will start preschool between August 28 and September 18, 2023, as spaces at preschool programs become available. We partner with 17 independent, community-based early education and care programs in Cambridge.

Applications accepted February 15 to March 15, 2023.

(Scholarships are not awarded on a first come, first serve basis.) **Online application:** <u>bit.ly/b3application</u> Paper applications are also accepted.



Not all families who apply will be awarded scholarships.

Indicators of low household income:

- Family's school-age children qualify for free or reduced lunch
- Family lives in Public or Section 8 Housing
- Family has SNAP Benefits (food stamps)
- Children enrolled with WIC
- Family receives TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families)

Priority for scholarships will be given to families who:

- Families with income below 50% of the HUD Area Median Income (below 63,000 for a family of 3, for example)
- Families who face challenges that may impact their child's learning and development.
- Children who have lacked opportunities to be with peers and receive support for learning and development

Parents/Caregivers do not need to be working or going to school to qualify for scholarships. To be eligible, the child should <u>not</u> be currently attending a preschool program or have a Childcare Voucher from the State.

Children who have already been accepted for preschool next year are not eligible in most cases. Please note: The DHSP Preschool Program has its own tuition assistance program; Cambridge Public Schools three-yearold programs and the Head Start program are free. None of these programs require our scholarships.

OEC staff will work with families to determine their eligibility and priority status for scholarships. Family fees for preschool are on a sliding fee scale based on household income.



Cambridge Office of Early Childhood engages with teachers across the city to reflect on early childhood practice with the support of our Education Coaches.

Respecting Children's Boundaries



We are inspired by this wonderful book by Carrie Finison and Daniel Wiseman: <u>Don't Hug Doug (He Doesn't Like It)</u>. It was introduced to us by Kerri Klugman, a Cambridge preschool teacher during a Professional Learning Community meeting. Respecting children's boundaries and honoring them as active participants in everyday routines is a common topic of conversation in our meetings with teachers.

Why is this Important?

Our sensory preferences, cultural backgrounds, personal experiences, and neurological differences affect how we physically relate to each other and how we react to our environment. So, when it comes to the youngest of citizens, educators need to be intentional about noticing, honoring and inviting children to be active participants in the processes of discovering and recognizing their developing selves.

How Does It Look in Practice?

When changing a diaper, talk with the child and let them know what you are about to do, such as lift their legs; invite them to participate by pausing to see if they help. Ask older children how they would like to be greeted? Offer help wiping a nose or supporting a child to do it themselves. Post visuals to help children be as independent as possible when dressing for winter outdoor play. Give information to help children make choices. *Adults work together with children rather than acting upon them.*

"When babies wake up, I take some time to hold them and when they are ready I put them down so they settle into being awake. 




